### Junior Yearly Meeting Information

**JYM Program locations:** Due to elevator problems in Coblentz Hall, the Nursery and Preschool have moved from 2<sup>nd</sup> floor to basement ground level. Elementary classes meet in the Coblentz basement Game Room, as do the afternoon and evening program JYF meets in basement Coblentz in the CBD Seminar Room.

The JYM program is located much closer to you this year – before you know it, you're there! The rooms are staffed at 9:20 in the morning, 1:50 in the afternoon and 7:20 for evening sessions. Thank you for respecting the room and staff times. Because of supplies and ongoing projects, children are not to play in rooms in non-program time.

**Afternoon Parent Co-op:** A parent-staffed, co-op aftercare (rising K to rising 5<sup>th</sup>) will be offered immediately after the JYM afternoon program (Basement Coblentz in game room) from 4-5 pm on Thursday, Friday and Saturday. Being part of this program will allow you to attend interest groups and committee meetings, *as long as you have signed up to work one shift.* 

There will be no JYM Program during evening programs on Thursday or Saturday. On Saturday evening, the Young Friends will host a **coffeehouse/talent show**. Both of these events are family-friendly — we look forward to seeing you there. Please note that children should be supervised by a parent or other designated adult at these events. Supervision will *not* be provided by JYM staff or event organizers.

Swimming: During the Afternoon program (2-4pm), on Thursday, JYM (K- middle school) will walk to the community pool and enjoy swimming and playing. Children who want to go swimming should come to their program with a towel, wearing their swim suit and sunscreen. Pick-up and drop-off for K-5<sup>th</sup> swimmers will be in front of Coblentz Hall.

Adult volunteers are needed! Parents (and others) are welcome to join us for swimming. See a JYM staff person for details. Children who would prefer to stay on campus for indoor activities instead of swimming should meet at the Game Room, in Coblentz Hall basement. Weather looks promising, but if the trip needs to be cancelled due to rain/thunderstorms, we will have a rain date on Friday. Arrangements will be the same.

**Friday morning**, JYM will begin in business meeting. Children should arrive at the start of business meeting with their parents. After the Roll Call of Meetings, a brief presentation of JYM, and singing, teachers will gather up their children and head off to their classrooms.
